Synopsis

Act 1: In 1904, U.S. Naval officer, Pinkerton, rents a house on a hill in Nagasaki, Japan in preparation for his marriage to the geisha, Ciocio-san, nick-named "Butterfly." He is marrying for convenience believing that when he returns to America, the marriage will be automatically dissolved. Upon learning that she is to marry an American, Butterfly secretly converts to Christianity. No sooner has the marriage contract been signed than her uncle, the Bonze (a Japanese Buddhist priest), who has discovered her conversion, comes to the house, curses and renounces her and orders all the guests to leave. Pinkerton comforts Butterfly and the two sing a love duet before retiring for the evening.

Act 2: Three years later, Butterfly is waiting for Pinkerton's return, as he had gone back to America shortly after their wedding. She stubbornly holds onto her faith that he will come back to her refusing to listen to anyone that counsels her otherwise. The American Consul, Sharpless, comes to the house with a letter he has received from Pinkerton which asks him to break the news to Butterfly that Pinkerton is coming back to Japan. On hearing that Pinkerton is returning, Butterfly's excitement causes Sharpless to not finish reading the letter to her. Sharpless asks Butterfly what she would do if Pinkerton were to never return. She reveals that she gave birth to Pinkerton's son after he had left and asks Sharpless to tell him.

Right after Sharpless leaves, Butterfly sees Pinkerton's ship arriving in the harbor. She and Suzuki prepare for his arrival, and then wait. Suzuki and the child fall asleep, but Butterfly stays up all night watching for his arrival.

Act 3: Suzuki wakes up in the morning and sends Butterfly to bed. Sharpless and Pinkerton arrive at the house, along with Pinkerton's new American wife, Kate who has agreed to raise the child. As Pinkerton sees how Butterfly has decorated the house for his return, he realizes he has made a huge mistake. He admits that he is a coward and cannot face her. He leaves and Suzuki, Sharpless and Kate must break the news to Butterfly. Agreeing to give up her child if Pinkerton comes himself to see her, she then prays to statues of her ancestral gods, says goodbye to her son, and blindfolds him. She places a small American flag into his hands and goes behind a screen, cutting her throat with her father's knife. Pinkerton rushes in, but too late.

Sinopsis:

Acto 1: En 1904, un oficial de la Marina de los Estados Unidos, Pinkerton, alquila una casa en una colina en Nagasaki, Japón, en preparación para su matrimonio con la geisha, Cio-cio-san, llamada "Butterfly". Se está casando por conveniencia creyendo que cuando regrese a Estados Unidos, el matrimonio se disolverá automáticamente. Al enterarse de que se va a casar con un estadounidense, Butterfly se convierte en secreto al cristianismo. Apenas se ha firmado el contrato matrimonial, su tío, el Bonze (un sacerdote budista japonés), quien descubrió sobre su conversión, llega a la casa de Butterfly, la maldice y ordena a todos los invitados que se vayan. Pinkerton consuela a Butterfly y los dos cantan un dúo de amor antes de retirarse por la noche.

Acto 2: Tres años después, Butterfly está esperando el retorno de Pinkerton, ya que había regresado a Estados Unidos poco después de su boda. Tercamente ella se aferra a su fe de que él volverá a ella, negándose a escuchar a cualquiera que le aconseje lo contrario. El cónsul estadounidense, Sharpless, llega a la casa con una carta que ha recibido de Pinkerton en la que le pide que le avise a Butterfly de que Pinkerton está regresando a Japón. La emoción de enterarse del regreso de Pinkerton hace que Butterfly no permita que Sharpless termine de leerle la carta. Sharpless le pregunta a Butterfly qué haría si Pinkerton nunca regresara. Ella revela que dio a luz al hijo de Pinkerton después de que él se fue y le pide a Sharpless que se lo diga.

Justo después de que Sharpless se va, Butterfly ve el barco de Pinkerton llegando al puerto. Ella y Suzuki se preparan para su llegada, y luego esperan. Suzuki y el niño se quedan dormidos, pero Butterfly se queda despierta toda la noche mirando la llegada de Pinkerton.

Acto 3: Suzuki se despierta en la mañana y envía a Butterfly a la cama. Sharpless y Pinkerton llegan a la casa, junto con Kate la nueva esposa estadounidense de Pinkerton, que ha aceptado criar al niño. Cuando Pinkerton ve cómo Butterfly ha decorado la casa para su regreso, se da cuenta de que ha cometido un gran error. Admite que es un cobarde y no puede enfrentarse a ella. Él se va y Suzuki, Sharpless y Kate deben dar la noticia a Butterfly. Butterfly Aceptan renunciar a su hijo si Pinkerton viene a verla, luego reza a las estatuas de sus dioses ancestrales, se despide de su hijo y le venda los ojos. Ella coloca una pequeña bandera estadounidense en sus manos y va detrás de un biombo, cortándose la garganta con el cuchillo de su padre. Pinkerton se apresura, pero llega demasiado tarde.
